### **Year 11 History Students Step Back in Time on Educational Visit**

Last week, Year 11 GCSE History students embarked on an exciting educational visit to London, where they explored two remarkable historical sites: The Golden Hinde and The Old Operating Theatre Museum. The trip provided an immersive experience that deepened students' understanding of maritime history and the evolution of medical practices.

At The Golden Hinde, students stepped aboard a reconstructed 16th-century galleon, gaining firsthand insight into the challenges faced by sailors during the Age of Exploration. The visit highlighted the harsh conditions, navigation techniques, and the significance of Sir Francis Drake's voyages. Additionally, students gained a detailed knowledge of 17th-century weaponry, learning about the different types of firearms and cannons used in naval warfare, as well as the strategies employed in sea battles.

The journey continued at The Old Operating Theatre Museum, where students explored the realities of surgery before modern anesthesia. The visit shed light on early medical procedures, surgical advancements, and the development of healthcare over time.

This trip brought history to life, enhancing classroom learning with real-world experiences. Students left with a greater appreciation of the past and its influence on the modern world.





















"The trip gave me a better understanding of what surgery was like during the Victorian era. I took part in a demonstration of an amputation, which showed how unsanitary and dangerous surgeries were at the time. Lying on the operating table made me feel a sense of worry—seeing all the surgical tools being taken out of boxes and realising they may have been used to cut through someone's bones. It was a fascinating experience, and I enjoyed it overall." Lavinia.G

"The visits to the Golden Hinde and the Old Operating Theatre Museum were fascinating and really broadened my understanding. On the ship, we got a sense of what life was like at sea and learned about the Spanish Armada from the Spanish perspective. The museum provided a detailed history of medicine from medieval times to the modern era, and the guide's talk will definitely help with my revision." Treasure. O

### Pathway to Employment: Preparing Students for the Future

The Basildon Upper Academy recently hosted the Pathway to Employment programme, an interactive and engaging initiative designed to equip students with essential employability skills. Led by Sally Hinkins and Penny Reason from Enterprise in Education and funded by Make Happen, the programme provided students with invaluable insights into the job market, interview techniques, and the skills employers look for in candidates.

The morning session was packed with activities focused on employability, first impressions, and accessing the employment sector. Students explored job specifications, discussed transferable skills, and gained a deeper understanding of employer expectations. A highlight of the session was a group activity where students compared the skills required for different professions – from a care home worker to an England football manager – reinforcing the importance of adaptability in the workplace.

The afternoon was a great opportunity for students to gain real-world interview experience as they took part in mock interviews with industry professionals from organisations such as NatWest, Waitrose, Paul Robinson Solicitors, and CNH. This hands-on experience allowed them to put their learning into practice, receiving valuable feedback on their interview skills, body language, and responses to common questions.

Throughout the day, students were also introduced to key aspects of career planning, including the importance of LinkedIn for networking, CV writing best practices, and building a personal brand to showcase achievements and ambitions. The programme left students with greater confidence and a clearer understanding of how to navigate the employment landscape.

By engaging in hands-on activities and professional interviews, students gained the tools they need to stand out in the job market, ensuring they are well-prepared for their future careers.

Eid al-Fitr				
Monday:	Festivity (Noun) perayaan in Malay Definition: The celebration of a religious or other festival. Example: Eid al-Fitr is a major festivity marking the end of Ramadan, celebrated with feasts and community gatherings.			
Tuesday: April Fool's Day	Hoax (Noun) păcăleală in Romanian Definition: A humorous or malicious deception, often intended to trick someone. Example: Many playful hoaxes are carried out on Hoax Day, also known as April Fools' Day, as part of the tradition of light-hearted pranks.			
Wednesday: World Autism Awareness Day	Neurodiversity (Noun) niwroamrywiaeth in Welsh Definition: The concept that neurological differences are to be recognised and respected as any other human variation. Example: World Autism Awareness Day promotes neurodiversity, advocating for understanding and acceptance of autistic individuals.			
Thursday:	Sensory (Adjective) pūoko in Maori Definition: Relating to sensation or the physical senses. Example: Sensory processing issues are often discussed on World Autism Awareness Day, highlighting the unique experiences of autistic individuals.			
Friday:	Inclusivity (Noun) inklusiwiteit in Afrikaans Definition: The practice or policy of including people who might otherwise be excluded or marginalised. Example: World Autism Awareness Day focuses on promoting inclusivity in all areas of society for autistic individuals.			

# Job of the Week: Lighting Engineer

#### What does a Lighting Engineer do?

You'll usually specialise in film and TV, or theatre, concerts and live events. Your work would range from basic spotlighting to operating strobes, lasers and pyrotechnics.

Depending on your role, your day-to-day tasks may include: interpreting a lighting designer's plan

carrying out risk assessments for health and safety purposes planning where to run cables and place lights at film locations helping to rig and check the equipment
