BRILLIANT PROJECT UNDERWAY

As part of the Brilliant Club Scholars Programme a selection of Year 10 students spent the day at Royal Holloway University of London. The visit marked the launch of the programme which will see our students take part in a university-style project led by tutor and postdoctoral research scientist, Christopher Schultz.

During the introductory session, Christopher, who has a PhD in Immunology and Molecular Medicine, explained what the students will be researching for their project 'Feeling Better: From Holistic Healing to Magic Bullets'.

The University itself was established in 1886 by Queen Victoria and was originally set up as a female-only college. During a guided tour, our students could not help but be inspired by the impressive history and architecture of the buildings.

"In the Art Gallery there was a painting of polar bears that is believed to be haunted, during exams they cover the painting up as it is believed to be an omen of failure" said Year 10 student Abby Dangerfield. Abby has ambition to study at university and become a teacher.



During their last session of the day, the Year 10 group were shown techniques on referencing and research. Student Alicia Pitt, who wants to be become a Clinical Psychologist, was really impressed, commenting: "In our miniature lecture we were taught about Chicagostyle referencing and in-text citations. It was interesting and I hope to learn and develop these skills."

ROAD SAFETY ADVICE FOR YEAR 12

With many of our Sixth Form students soon to be getting behind the wheel for the first time, the recent visit from the Essex Roadster Team was perfectly timed! The Essex Roadster Team, which includes members of the Essex Fire Brigade and Road Safety Officers, brought with them expert advice and very some important safety messages.



During the morning session, Road Safety Officer, Gillian Beale, pictured above, explained to students the dangers of driving under the influence of alcohol and drugs. Real life scenarios were discussed, along with some hard hitting facts and figures.

A recurring message throughout the morning was how one person's 'misguided' actions can lead to devastating effects for many others. Guest speaker Darren Goldie, who has visited the Academies before, spoke to our students from his own personal experience and explained how he had discovered the hard way that drugs ruin lives.

INTERIOR DESIGNER VISITS SIXTH FORM

Our Sixth Form students recently welcomed professional interior designer, Stephanie Bland, who came in to share her experiences and talk about opportunities available to study art related courses at degree level.

During her career, Stephanie has been part of many exciting projects, including designs for various prestigious overseas casinos and hotels. She has also worked on the Royal Opera House in London.

STUDENTS ACHIEVE FIREBREAK QUALIFICATION

A small group of Upper Academy students spent a week at Basildon Fire Station to train for, and gain a Firebreak qualification. Working alongside serving firefighters, the course aims to develop confidence, teamwork, self-esteem, self-belief and a sense of citizenship and community engagement in all those taking part.

Participants received a high level of education around fire safety in the home and safety on the roads. New life skills were learnt, such as effective communication, leadership and first aid. Skills were delivered through fire-service based activities such as high pressure hose drills, casualty rescues, breathing apparatus scenarios, search and rescue, ladder pitching and climbing, and many more.

On the final day of training skills were put on display in front of family members, friends, schools and supporters in a very special Passing out Parade. All participants were awarded with a personalised Certificate of Achievement from the Chief Fire Officer of Essex Fire Service, as well as a Level 1 AQA Award in Community Firefighting training skills, which is of GCSE standard.
