

Leadership Message – Trauma Perceptive Practice

At The Basildon Academies, we believe that every interaction with a young person is an opportunity to make a difference. This belief sits at the heart of our Trauma Perceptive Practice, often called TPP. It is an Essex-wide approach that helps us understand behaviour through the lens of experience, not as a matter of defiance.

TPP encourages us to pause and ask, "What has happened to this young person?" rather than "What is wrong with them?" When we take time to understand what sits beneath a behaviour, we can respond in ways that build trust and emotional safety. This creates a stronger foundation for learning, wellbeing, and personal growth.

Across the Academies, our staff are developing this practice every day. You will see it in the calm and consistent way adults respond to challenge, in the positive language we use, and in the value we place on repairing relationships. We know that children thrive when they feel safe, connected, and respected.

Trauma Perceptive Practice reminds us that compassion and high expectations belong together. Through this balance, we help our young people to reflect, to regulate, and to succeed both in school and beyond it.

This qualification is based on the hairdressing National Occupational Standards (NOS) and is recognised by the UK's leading professional body (The Hairdressing Council) as being fit for purpose for preparing students for a career as a junior hairdresser/stylist.

The aim of the course is to develop hairdressing skills and knowledge and it will also enable you to perform your own services and to assist others in the salon. Students will gather evidence for assessment through the study of mandatory and optional units, in a real working environment without the need for fee-paying clients.

Basildon Academies Honour the Fallen on Remembrance Day

Last week, during Remembrance Day, staff and students across The Basildon Academies joined together in a two-minute silence, taking time to reflect and pay tribute to the bravery and sacrifice of our armed forces.

The school fell silent as students and staff paused to show their respect and gratitude to those who have served and continue to serve in times of conflict.

Following the silence, students shared their thoughts and reflections on what Remembrance Day means to them expressing deep appreciation for the courage and commitment of past and present service members.



"Remembrance Day is a day to remember the fallen and the lives of soldiers. This is important to me because my Great Grandad was a member of the Tank Regiment during World War II, taking part in the campaign in Italy. Students Explore Real-Life Scenarios During Anti-Bullying Week

As part of Anti-Bullying Week, groups of Year 10 and Year 11 students took part in a series of engaging activities designed to promote empathy, respect, and understanding.

Using materials provided by the Anti-Bullying Alliance, students discussed real-life scenarios from the Secondary Scenarios Handout, exploring how bystanders can respond safely and positively when they witness bullying.

Alongside these discussions, students also took part in interactive activities, including themed word searches and teamwork challenges that reinforced the week's message of "The Power of Good."







These sessions encouraged students to reflect on how their actions can make a positive difference; supporting one of our six core values, that Kindness is Everything.

Year 11 Get a Hard-Hitting Lesson in Road Safety

Our Year 11 students recently took part in a powerful and memorable road safety workshop run by the Safer Essex Roads Partnership (SERP). Their aim is Vision Zero; making sure there are no deaths or serious injuries on Essex roads by 2040, and this session really helped show why that goal matters.

Many students were surprised to learn that road traffic accidents are the number one cause of death for young people aged 5–29. As soon as teenagers start using cars and motorbikes, the risk increases sharply; something the workshop aimed to make really clear.

Instead of simply talking about the 'Fatal Four' causes of crashes - speeding, drink or drug driving, not wearing seatbelts, and distractions, our students watched these situations come to life through a powerful play. Each scene showed how these risks can build up in real moments that young people might face, and how one quick decision or giving in to peer pressure can lead to a dangerous outcome.

Students watched a multi-media theatre performance that included dramatic scenes, monologues, sound effects, and visuals. It took them through the moments leading up to a crash and showed the emotional and long-term impact that follows. Many students said it felt very real and really made them think about the choices they'll face when they start driving or riding as passengers.

Overall, our Year 11 students learned a lot about how quickly things can go wrong on the road and how important it is to stay safe, speak up, and look out for each other. The workshop definitely gave everyone something to think about as they move towards becoming young drivers.

"The assembly yesterday was both very entertaining and educational. The play at the start offered a performance that was engaging and gave a look into actual experiences. The talk after was a very good way to end the workshop and gave insight into real world statistics" Hayden.A

"The whole workshop enlightened me on ideas that never really occurred to me about road safety. It has made me more aware on how to be careful when I eventually learn how to drive" Lee.M

"I liked how they used a play to educate us. I also liked how they used a scenario that could happen to anyone at any time. They also used statistics to show how much driving affects people in multiple different ways" Hannah.A

"I believe the road safety assembly was informative, as statistics and possible real-life cases were given. It allowed everyone to better understand the effects of unsafe driving, and therefore empathise and treat the deaths related to vehicles with more compassion" Yanna.I


